1. THE ANNUAL CAMPUS SAFETY AND SECURITY REPORT

Peloton College (Branch Campus) encourages all students and employees to be completely aware of the safety and security issues on the campus. In addition the college expects that students and employees will take action to prevent security issues and to report any illegal and inappropriate activities. Peloton College firmly believes that personal safety practices are the foundation of a safe campus community.

Therefore, and pursuant to the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, Peloton College (1) monitors criminal activity, (2) publishes this annual report, and (3) maintains a three-year statistical history on its campus. The college will distribute a copy of this report pursuant to the Clery Act, including notifying prospective students and prospective employees of its availability and, further, providing a copy of the report upon written request.

Peloton College has no authority to require any local law enforcement agency in any state in which the college maintains campuses and campus facilities or the judicial court process to take any action in connection with a reported crime. Peloton College encourages prosecution of all criminal violations through the criminal courts and, if appropriate, the college student conduct process for violations committed on campus by other students.

Peloton College currently has a number of policies and procedures relating to campus security and safety, and the college expressly reserves the right to modify those policies or procedures or adopt additional policies or procedures at any time without notice. Such changes may appear in successive issues of this annual report. Furthermore, the college maintains policies on alcohol and drugs, sexual harassment and student conduct that describe expectations in student behavior. An employee policy manual outlines the college's requirements for staff in terms of emergencies and interaction with others in accordance with the college's mission and purposes.

2. CRIME REPORTING POLICIES

A. Reporting Policies

1. The college does not maintain a campus police or campus safety department. The Branch campus is monitored by the security officials with the Aqua Investment Group in which the campus is located. Security may be contacted by calling 817-543-0335. All criminal reports should be made on each campus as follows:

Everyone on campus (including students, faculty, staff and visitors) is encouraged to report immediately any crime or potential criminal activity to the local police department (911) that serves the campus location where the crime occurred. Individuals reporting to Peloton Branch who also wish to file a complaint with the local police department will be provided with assistance from Peloton personnel upon request. The management team of the branch campus should be the primary personnel that are contacted. The management team of the branch campus consists of the following: Campus President (Director), Director of Career Services, Registrar, Director of Financial Aid, and faculty. These personnel will serve as the college's liaison with all appropriate law enforcement agencies on each respective campus.

1. Peloton College normally requires a written complaint from someone to begin the investigation

process. The college also normally needs the assistance of the complainant in the disciplinary process, if applicable, against the accused. The college will make exceptions when necessary, including cases presenting clear danger to the victim and/or the college community.

2. The college will respond to reports of criminal activity by investigating all allegations in conjunction with the local police department and forward the case to the college director for investigation and appropriate action when alleged perpetrators are identified as students, which investigation may occur independently, before, during or after any campus judicial process.

B. Crime Reporting Procedures

1. All criminal activity occurring on campus should be reported immediately to the appropriate local campus management as listed in Paragraph 2.A.1. or the appropriate local police department (911). Campus personnel will assist the complainant in completing criminal reports. These reports will also be forwarded to the appropriate police department. In certain cases, reports will also be shared with college personnel for campus conduct proceedings. The college will assist the appropriate local police department with investigations.
2. If you are a victim of a crime or witness a crime:
 - a. Call the campus management for the campus on which the criminal activity occurred or the local police department (dial 911) for any emergency including medical assistance, fires, suspicious people or activities, crime reports, traffic accidents, or other illegal activities;
 - b. Obtain a description of the offender(s), including sex, age, race, hair, clothing and other distinguishable features. Attempt to obtain a description and license number of any vehicle involved. Note the direction taken by offenders or vehicles and report those to campus security or the police; and
 - c. Preserve the crime scene. Do not touch any items involved in the incident. Close off the area of the incident and do not allow anyone in the crime area until the campus management and/or local police arrive.
3. The appropriate campus management will accept third-party reports in cases of sexual assault in order to protect the victim's identity.
4. All employees, faculty or staff who become aware of an allegation of violation of college policy, student code of conduct, civil or criminal law should report the allegation to their supervisor or senior campus administrator. The following people with "significant responsibility" for student and campus activities must report potential criminal activity of which they are aware: academic deans, directors of admissions, career planning and student services personnel, deans, department chairs, financial aid director, human resources director, president, registrar, librarian, as well as any assistants and associates. These individuals should not attempt to investigate, but should instead report and allow the police to investigate. Licensed and pastoral counselors are exempted from these reporting procedures. The function of these administrators (significant responsibility) is not to determine whether a crime took place. That is the function of the law enforcement professionals working within the criminal justice system.
5. All persons in the Arlington community are encouraged to assist anyone in reporting alleged criminal activity by contacting the campus management at the campus where the criminal activity occurred and/or the local police department, as well as providing assistance in making the incident report.
6. Failure to report criminal activity to the campus management in a timely manner may result in

disciplinary action by the college.

7. College employees and students, who are not members of the campus management, are encouraged to assist anyone reporting alleged criminal activity in contacting the campus management and/or the local police department in order to file a criminal report.
8. Criminal activity may be reported voluntarily and confidentially to the campus management.

C. Timely Warning Reports

- a. The college will issue a timely warning to members of the campus community in cases of reported murder (non-negligent), sex offenses, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft and any hate crimes (manifesting evidence of prejudice based on race, religion, sexual orientation or ethnicity) of murder, forcible rape or aggravated assault, in those cases where college personnel determine there is a continuing threat to the college community. In such cases, timely warnings will be published at the applicable campus on bulletin boards in the student lounge as well as other locations on campus.

D. Preparation of Annual Security Report

- b. Peloton College will issue an annual report of criminal reports made to campus security authorities and law enforcement agencies for property or facilities. The annual report includes reported crimes alleged to have occurred on the campus and facilities owned or rented by Peloton Branch and/or recognized student organizations. It includes the following reports of crime: (a) murder (negligent/non-negligent), (b) sex offenses (forcible/non-forcible), (c) robbery, (d) aggravated assault, (e) burglary, (f) motor vehicle theft, (g) murders evidencing hate crime, (h) forcible rape evidencing hate crime, (i) aggravated assault evidencing hate crime, (j) liquor law violations, (k) drug abuse violations, and (l) weapons possession. Information obtained from incident reports from all campuses in the Peloton College system are forwarded to the student services personnel on campus. The results are then tabulated and ultimately entered into the Department of Education's website each September as required by law. The Annual Crime Awareness and Campus Security Report is then compiled from these data and either the report, or notification of the existence of the report, is distributed to campus security officers to make available to college students and employees.

3. SAFETY OF AND ACCESS TO CAMPUS FACILITIES

A. Personal Safety Recommendations:

1. Peloton College staff are available to assist you in protecting yourself by providing safety and security information, such as posters and brochures. However, only you can protect yourself by being aware of your surroundings and taking appropriate steps in preventing crime from happening.
2. Do not prop open locked interior building doors at the Branch campus. These doors are locked for your protection and the protection of others.

B. Protect Your Property

1. Personal property (purses, briefcases, calculators, computers, etc.) should never be left unattended. Take such items with you if you are leaving the office, classroom, residence hall or any other unsecured location.
2. Always lock your car doors.

3. Do not leave valuables in plain view. Always take your valuables with you when you leave the campus premises.

C. Protect Your Automobile

1. Always lock your car doors and never leave your keys in the vehicle.
2. Try to park your car in a well-lit area.
3. Avoid leaving property where it is visible.
4. If you arrive at or leave the Peloton College late at night, you should use extra caution when walking to your vehicle. It is preferable to walk to the parking lot with others if at all possible.

D. Protect Yourself At Night

1. Avoid walking alone at night.
2. Refrain from taking shortcuts and walk where there is plenty of light and traffic.
3. Walk with a friend.

F. Help Peloton Branch Protect You

1. Watch for suspicious persons in and around college buildings and in parking lots. Do not pursue them. Call the campus management immediately
2. If you see any suspicious activity or people on or near campus, call the campus management on your campus or the local police department (911). Do not assume that what you observe is an innocent activity or that it has already been reported.
3. Do not assume the person is a visitor or college staff member who you have not seen before.
4. Suspicious people may be loitering about at unusual hours and locations, running, especially if something of value is being carried. Exhibiting unusual mental or physical symptoms, persons could be under the influence of drugs or otherwise needing medical or psychiatric assistance. Carrying property that may be suspicious depending on the circumstances, going room to room trying door handles. Door-to-door soliciting is not permitted at any college facility. Violations of this rule should be reported to the campus management or the local police immediately.
5. Report all thefts and property loss immediately to the campus management or the local police.
6. Be security conscious at all times.

H. Policies And Procedures For Safe Access To Buildings

1. Keys are issued to authorized faculty, staff and students only.
2. Building evacuation is mandatory for all fire alarms.
3. Problems related to people in buildings after hours should be reported to the campus management at the campus where the activity occurred.

4. Peloton's RELATIONSHIP WITH LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT

- A. Peloton College is committed to working closely with local police departments, sheriff's departments and state and federal law enforcement agencies to track and respond to campus criminal activity.
- B. Students and employees are strongly encouraged to report all crimes immediately. All criminal activity on the branch campus should be reported to the campus management on the campus where

the activity took place (see Paragraph 2.A.1.) and/or the appropriate local police department (911).

- C. Peloton College personnel will assist the complainant in completing any criminal reports.
- D. Peloton College will accept third party reports in most cases (e.g., sex offenses). However, the college prefers to receive reports from the victim as the detail is often more accurate when received directly from the victim.
- E. Victims and witnesses to crimes should attempt to maintain all physical evidence. Do not wash or destroy what may be critical evidence.
- F. Victims and witnesses should report as much detail as possible to ensure accurate reporting. If you are a victim of a crime, your immediate recall of the event is often the best. Write down as much information as you can remember after a crime. If you cannot identify the perpetrator by name, try to recall as many details as possible, including gender; approximate age; height; weight/build; description of face including eye color, hair color; hair styles (short, curly, etc.); dress/clothing; facial hair; glasses; distinguishing marks including scars; distinguishing gait; and voice.

5. CRIME SAFETY AND CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAMMING

Peloton College provides certain crime safety and crime prevention programs and services including crime prevention brochures, student handbook, sexual assault awareness information, etc. For more information concerning crime safety and crime prevention programs/services visit the local campus management.

- A. Annual Report Distribution: Peloton College will distribute notification of the existence and location of the Annual Crime Awareness and Campus Security Report Act to all students, faculty, staff and employees by October 1st of each year. The annual report may also be viewed at the following web site:

 - 3. To search for an institution, enter or select from one or more of the criteria in the fields shown.
 - 4. In the Name of Institution field, enter Peloton College. In the Institution City field, enter Arlington.
 - 5. In the Institution State or Outlying Area criteria field, select Texas.
 - 6. Scroll down to the bottom of the page and click search.
 - 7. In the search results page. You will see Peloton College under institution/campus list. Click on the Main Campus link.
 - 8. Mid-page, there are four sections/links highlighted in gray which, when clicked, show the data reported for Criminal Offenses, Hate Crimes, Arrests, and Disciplinary Actions.

A paper copy of the annual report may be obtained by contacting the campus management on campus.

- B. Past Annual Reports: Copies of the college's past annual reports may be obtained on the website

above or by contacting (214) 777-6433.

- C. Assistance: In cases where the alleged perpetrator is a student and taking the same classes as the complainant, the complainant may request the Peloton College registrar to change class schedules. Such requests will be granted if reasonably available and if a complaint has been filed with Peloton College and/or the appropriate local police department. If desired, PELOTON personnel will assist individuals in making a report to the local police department.
- D. Peloton College provides programs on campus safety and security. Each campus develops and presents educational programs (at least one program per calendar year) in the areas of crime prevention, sexual assault awareness, self-defense, annoying phone calls, personal safety, etc. Peloton College also has available brochures, flyers, pamphlets, movies, videos and posters concerning various safety and security issues. The college will develop and present any security-related program upon request.
- E. Peloton College has a means of notifying students, faculty and staff on how to obtain information about registered sex offenders. In that regard, student handbooks, bulletin boards, dean of student services' offices and learning resources centers have posted the 1-800 numbers in each state where PELOTON has a campus. Selected states also have web site information available. Students and employees may access those telephone numbers or websites to check on any person, student or employee they feel is a possible registered sex offender.

Peloton College also provides outreach counseling information to aid students in coping with a variety of issues, including sexual assault awareness, personal safety, alcohol and drug abuse.

6. CAMPUS CRIME TIMELY WARNING

If the campus management on the campus where a criminal activity has occurred determines that the crime (or series of crimes) poses a continuing threat or danger to the college community, the college will publish a warning through any or all of the following media: campus bulletins, classroom announcements, campus newspaper, electronic mail, etc.

7. POLICY REGARDING THE ILLEGALITY OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ON PELOTON CAMPUSES AND ENFORCEMENT OF UNDERAGE DRINKING

- A. Peloton College forbids the use, consumption, possession, manufacture, sale, transportation or furnishing of alcoholic beverages on campus. The college also forbids the maintenance of unlawful drinking places on its campus. This prohibition of possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages on campus applies regardless of age.
- B. Peloton College enforces the drinking laws of Texas, including the prohibition of use by persons less than 21 years of age. Possession or consumption of alcohol on any campus is prohibited by Peloton College and may result in student disciplinary proceedings and/or arrest.

8. POLICY REGARDING THE ILLEGALITY OF DRUGS ON PELOTON CAMPUSES AND THE ENFORCEMENT OF FEDERAL AND STATE DRUG LAWS

- A. Peloton College forbids the sale of illegal drugs on its campus. This policy includes, but is not limited to, possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing and making of narcotic drugs.
- B. Peloton College enforces Texas state law, as well as federal drug laws regarding the use, possession and sale of illegal drugs. The college's complete policy may be found in the PELOTON Employee Handbook and PELOTON Student Handbook.

9. DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE EDUCATION PROGRAMS

- A.** Peloton College's Drug and Alcohol policy includes prohibitions against unlawful drug use or abuse in the workplace in accordance with the Drug Free Workplace Act of 1988 (Public Law 100-690, Title V, Subtitle D) and Drug Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989 (Public Law 101-226). The drug and alcohol-abuse education programs at the college are consistent with the requirements under Section 120(a)-(d) of the HEA.
- B.** The college recognizes the reality of chemical dependency and is aware of its occasional presence in the college community. As a safeguard against this dependency, numerous outside organizations provide prevention programs to the Peloton College community.
- C.** Peloton College encourages and provides reasonable assistance to any student, faculty or staff member who seeks information on chemical dependency or treatment for chemical dependency. All campuses provide information and prevention programs for those seeking help with substance abuse. The college has established policies and procedures related to harassment, sexual harassment and violent behavior of students and employees. These policies are documented in the PELOTON Employee Handbook and the PELOTON Student Handbook

10. REPORTING OF SEXUAL OFFENSES AND HARASSMENT

A. Policy

Peloton College is committed to a policy of nondiscrimination in employment and education opportunity. No person shall be discriminated against in the terms and conditions of employment, personnel practices, or access to and participation in education programs, services, and activities with regard to race, sex, color, creed, religion, age, national origin, disability, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, or sexual orientation or membership or activity in a local commission as defined by state and federal law, as applicable.

Harassment of an individual or group on the basis of race, sex, color, creed, religion, age, national origin, disability, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, or sexual orientation, or membership or activity in a local commission has no place in a learning or work environment and is prohibited. Sexual violence has no place in a learning or work environment. Further, Peloton College shall work to eliminate violence in all forms. Physical contact by college staff members may be appropriate if necessary to avoid physical harm to persons or property.

This policy is directed at verbal and physical conduct that constitutes discrimination/harassment under applicable state and federal law and is not directed at the content of speech. In cases in which verbal statements and other forms of expression are involved, Peloton College will give due consideration to an individual's constitutionally protected right to free speech and academic freedom.

In support of the college policy, Peloton College reaffirms its policy that sexual harassment, including violence, abuse and harassment will not be tolerated. Every effort will be made to ensure that all members of the college community are provided an atmosphere free from sexual harassment. To prevent sexual offenses and harassment, educational efforts will be undertaken to inform employees and students of their responsibilities regarding such behavior, how to identify and eliminate sexual harassment, and what steps can be taken if instances of sexual harassment are experienced.

Peloton College conducts a number of programs aimed at preventing sexual offenses and making the campus community aware of the potential of such crimes. In addition, educational programs concerning sexual assault awareness are provided by Peloton College upon request.

B. Procedure

Contact the local campus management (as identified in Paragraph 2.1.A.) and/or the local police department (911) as soon as possible after the offense. Please remember it is most important to preserve evidence. Do not bathe, douche, use the toilet or change clothing. Note everything about the location. If you have been sexually assaulted, you should seek medical attention immediately regardless of whether you want to report the matter to the police or Blank School.

Every attempt is made to maintain the anonymity of the sexual assault survivor. The local campus management will provide information regarding counseling to support sexual assault survivors. Each report of a sexual assault will be investigated in order to provide better protection to the survivor and all members of the campus community. Sexual assault survivors should be aware of the need of the college to release information regarding the fact that an assault has occurred for the protection and safety of others. Information concerning the identity, address and other personal information of the sexual assault survivor will not be release.

The local campus management's office will be the office of official record for reports of sexual assaults, as it is in all reported violations. Student, faculty and staff are encouraged to contact the local campus management to report any information regarding a sexual assault. Sexual assault survivors have the right to have reports made to the appropriate local police department. The campus management will assist the survivor in making this report if the survivor so wishes. In these situations, the name of the complainant will not be forwarded unless approved by the survivor. Third party and anonymous reports may prevent Peloton College and law enforcement from actively investigating the criminal activity.

If you are the victim of a sexual assault, Peloton College encourages you to contact one or more of the following: the appropriate local police department, the local Peloton College campus management, local crisis counseling centers, local health services clinics, women's resource centers or the local hospital.

If the local campus management (or his/her designee) determines that a threat continues to exist for the campus community where the criminal activity occurred, information about the reported sexual assault will be reported to the campus community whether reported by a sexual survivor or through a third party report. As much detail as possible regarding location, date and time of the assault, and any information that might help identify the assailant will be reported. The local campus management (or his/her designee) will inform the campus community of the reported sexual assault by posters, appropriate notices, campus newspaper, electronic mail and/or other means.

Each report will be taken as presented by the complainant. Appropriate criminal classifications will be determined after a review of all facts by local law enforcement authorities. Peloton College will take appropriate action to safeguard the alleged survivor and, at the same time, protect the rights of the alleged perpetrator.

Peloton College will normally not take any disciplinary action against any member of the campus community without a written complaint and the assistance of the complainant in the disciplinary process, unless the college determines there is a clear danger to the victim or the local campus community.

C. Procedures for Campus Disciplinary Action for Sex Offenses:

1. The Peloton College disciplinary process is an option for any person wishing to report a case of student misconduct. In order for Peloton College to proceed (whether by a victim or a third party), a report must be filed with the college. If the complaint is criminal in nature, it will also be forwarded to the local campus management and/or the local police department.
2. There are different standards of proof in the college conduct proceedings than in possible criminal action. The college conduct proceedings determine whether the accused's status as a student will be altered, whereas the criminal process determines if there will be limitations on the accused's liberty.
3. Both the accuser and the accused are entitled to have others present (an advocate or an advisory) during the disciplinary proceeding. This person may not speak in your place or ask questions of witnesses.
4. Both the accuser and the accused have the right to call a reasonable number of witnesses and shall have the right to question witnesses during the hearing.
5. Both the accuser and the accused have the right to request, in advance, the names of witnesses and shall have the right to question witnesses during the hearing.
6. Both the accuser and the accused will be informed of the outcomes of any campus disciplinary proceeding concerning the complaint of a sexual offense according to applicable state law. This information should not be disclosed to the public generally.
7. In cases where the alleged perpetrator is a student and taking the same classes as the complainant, the complainant may request the Peloton College registrar to change class schedules. Such requests will be granted if reasonably available and if a complaint has been filed with Peloton College and/or the appropriate local police department. If desired, PELOTON personnel will assist individuals in making a report to the local police department.

D. Registered Sex Offender Notification:

The federal Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act, enacted on October 28, 2000, requires higher education institutions to provide a list of law enforcement agency information provided by the state concerning registered sex offenders. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in state to provide notice, as required under state law, of each higher education institution in that state at which the person is employed, carries on a vocation or is a student.
